# **Year in Review: 2024-2025**

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE







The past fiscal year at the Naples Historical Society (November 2024 - October 2025) was busy! Below is an attempt to boast about it all, with apologies in advance for anything forgotten — it was a full year!

### **Events**

All of our newer annual fundraisers continued: the 4th annual Cookie Sale & Holiday Boutique, our 4th Chocolate Cake Contest, our Spring Raffle of a "Small CSA Share" from Schenk Homestead Farms, and the Naples Grape Festival, back stronger than ever after the early pandemic years. We also held 5 pop-up "Treasure Sales" throughout the year.

Several special events celebrated Naples history: "The Big Reveal" of a Grape Pie historic marker at Memorial Town Hall (which gained national attention — see article on page 4), the Cleveland House "Plant Give and Take" in preparation for foundation work, and "Frederick Douglass Day," celebrating Douglass's Naples connection, co-sponsored with the Naples Library, Bristol Valley Theater, FLX Music Supply, and Fruition Seeds.

## **Programs**

We hosted several guest presenters: South Bristol Historian Beth Thomas on "Bristol's Suffragist Emily Parmely Collins"; a Historic Tax Credit Workshop co-sponsored with the Preservation League of NY, the Landmark Society, and the Village of Naples; the Grape Pie Making Class by Meghanne Freivald; and a Headstone Repair Class by Dave Bloom.

Our original educational programs included: a presentation on Ephraim Cleveland and the Cleveland House by President Trish Lambiase at a regional DAR meeting; Past President Wayne Buchar hosting 8th grade students from the Harley School at the Maxfield Inn to discuss William Marks and the Underground Railroad; and Naples Historian Ken Poole's programs on "The Life and Art of Naples Artist Jane Loomis Gould," plus a talk and exhibition on artist Ira Randall, co-sponsored with the Bristol Hills Historical Society. Ever-popular tours of the Cleveland House, Memorial Town Hall, and Fairview Cemetery continued throughout the year.

# Other Projects

We have been working with the Finger Lakes Visitors Connection for the past several years on their "Virtual Museum" project, now in its final stages. You will soon see QR codes on some of Naples's historic markers linking to more information on the topic of each marker. We are also updating our self-guided walking tour of historic

Naples and have begun recording new audio narrations for each site.

Other projects included 3 newsletters; 2 informational booklets (on the Sutton String Band and Jane Loomis); and signage about native plantings around the Cleveland House. We awarded scholarships to two 2025 NCS graduates and presented two Historic Preservation Awards to local recipients.

### **Board Activities**

Between monthly board and committee meetings, members enjoyed some leisure activities: hosting the first VIP member reception at the Maxfield Inn this summer, and a "behind the scenes tour" of Hometown Wine Company to see the adaptive reuse of the former Cleveland House Carriage House.

Preservation work on the Naples Red Mill and Cleveland House remains a major commitment, whether through volunteer labor, materials, or fundraising. (\*See our summer newsletter for highlights of this year's progress; past issues are on our website under the "About" tab at naplesnyhistoricalsociety.org/newsletter-archive.)

Collections/Archives — The Morgan Hose Building is open every Thursday from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. The "Archive Angels" welcome researchers and visitors, accept ephemera to add to our collections, maintain history bulletin boards at Caruso's Café, and answer website and e-mail inquiries. Work in the Morgan Hose Building this year totaled more than 585 volunteer hours.

At this year's Annual Board Meeting, multiple trustees renewed their commitments. Renewing three-year terms: Blanche Warner, Cindy Scoda, Kim Torpey, and Jeff Wells. Renewing two-year officer terms: Trish Lambiase, President; Blanche Warner, Vice President; Cindy Scoda, Secretary.

### **Financials**

Since becoming President in 2021, one of my goals has been to ensure that the Naples Historical Society maintains a solid financial standing. A yearly challenge is the unpredictability of Grape Festival proceeds, shared with Naples Rotary. We were fortunate this past year to receive record funds, enabling early payoff of an EIDL (Economic Injury Disaster Loan) COVID loan.

The sale of the Carriage House enabled us to pay off the Cleveland House mortgage and start a renovation account with nearly \$93,000. We were able to invest in CD's with funds from our capital

reserve/renovation accounts which have generated more than \$1,500 in interest. Capital reserve funds will be used in 2026 for ongoing renovations of the Naples Red Mill and the Cleveland House.

We depend on and appreciate all donations, which support our mission and the maintenance of our historic buildings (more details on page 3).

## Membership

Last November we introduced a new "VIP" membership category (Very Important Preservationist). The \$250 dues go to the Capital Reserve Fund for preservation of our historic buildings. VIPs receive free admission to all programs and are invited to an annual VIP reception in a historic location. We welcomed 15 VIP members this year, adding \$3,750 to the Capital Reserve Fund. Our Individual/Family/Junior \$25 membership brought in 16 new members. Membership has remained consistent for the past several years, averaging about 150 members. New members are needed and welcome.

### Volunteers


