Naples Red Mill Updates ~ August 2024

Stabilization Progress

Work to clean out the Red Mill water wheel pit has been completed by Matthews House Movers (photos at right). **Bison Engineering** has been hired to assess the best way to stabilize the bulging west wall of the pit with a steel structure. While work was done in the pit, more foundation stone deterioration and another bowed wall were discovered that should be remedied before the steel bracing can be installed.

We are waiting for the engineering report before any stone wall repair can be done; and a proposal from **Timber Frames Inc.** for structural post/timber replacement and structural reinforcement.

When all repairs are made, Matthews House Movers will again be engaged to support the building before timbers are removed, replaced and installed.

Our Long-term Plan

To make "Bill's Dream" a reality, the Naples Historical Society has outlined this long-term, multi-component plan:

PART I: Building stabilization

PHASE I Clean out waterwheel pit, repoint stone foundation where needed and stabilize bulging basement stone walls

PHASE 2 Matthews House Movers temporary support structure in preparation for timber repair PHASE 3 Timber Frame Inc. beam replacement

PART II: Exterior residing, door and window replacement

PART III: Schematic planning for building spaces and interior design

PART IV: Organization of the collection and creation of a Naples History and Event Center

JUST ANNOUNCED **Grant Award!**

The Naples Historical Society has received a \$12,000 Vitality Grant from

the Rochester Area Community Foundation! This "Preserving Historical Assets" grant supports the Community foundation's goal to *strengthen regional vitality* by preserving the region's historical assets and promoting educational efforts that build on those assets.

We are grateful for this grant that will help cover costs for cleaning out the waterwheel pit at the Naples Red Mill and stabilize a bulging basement stone wall. This brings our "Bill's Dream" Capital Campaign fund for this project to \$98,319.35. We only need **\$1,680.65** to reach our goal of \$100,000 by December 2024 for Phase I of the building restoration.



We are only at the beginning of this ambitious project, and we continue to seek funding that will be necessary to keep moving forward. We are buoyed by

all the support we have received so far, and look forward to finding more benefactors and professional grant writers.



The Great Serpent of Bare Hill



The legend of the Great Serpent of Bare Hill is a Seneca story that is still with us today. In modern times, the Seneca tale goes this way; a young Seneca boy, while paddling his canoe through the swamp at the head of Canandaigua Lake, found a very pretty snake that he decided to take home to his longhouse.

The boy named his snake Osaista Wanna and fed it insects, frogs, and flies. The snake grew and grew until it was consuming squirrels, woodchucks, and raccoons. The snake continued to grow and clamored for more and larger game.

When the local supplies of deer and fish became depleted, the Seneca villagers decided to build a fort to protect themselves from the reptile. Their fort was built at the summit of Bare Hill. However, the monster serpent appeared and used its vast body to coil around the entire fort and the people. Many of the starving Seneca, seeking to escape in the dark, were eaten by the snake. Find this story and many more from Naples history among the displays at the Cleveland House Museum.

The only remaining children of the village, a young boy and his sister, relied on the advice given to them in their dreams. The boy was told how to slay the monster by stringing his bow with his sister's hair. He was told he must make one shot into the third scale on the serpent's throat, killing it. The youth shot the arrow, and it pierced the monster's heart.

Death did not come easily to the serpent . It writhed and twisted and turned for hours after it had been hit by the charmed arrow. When the serpent finally died, that entire hill was cleared of trees and bushes, and was named Bare Hill.

As the serpent plunged into Canandaigua Lake near Vine Valley, it disgorged the heads of its victims, most of which had turned to stone. Round stones found in the vicinity of Bare Hill are now known as septaria; local residents sometimes call them "Indian heads."
