# Happy Spring! We have the first painted rock in the Beth Flory Memorial Park garden - together with the first spring blooms!

And the winner is...... The Cleveland House received the largest amount of votes for Naples Gingerbread Village 2019. Quote from the anonymous baker: "This gingerbread house was made in the spirit of local history and celebrates the new museum in Naples".

> The Cleveland House was built in 1794 by Captain Ephraim Cleveland, a Revolutionary War officer. The house was one of the first frame homes in the village and has not changed much since it was built.



This year 40 adults and 62 children were involved in creating the houses for the Gingerbread Village. Families baked and played together in the kitchen. Friends had fun. Couples continued or started a new tradition. Two teachers at NCS introduced their students to the joy of gingerbread. "Spending time together creating is a gift in itself" a mother said when they delivered their house to the Morgan Hose Building. Gingerbread House baking is not as easy as many might think. Some participants experienced that too. Music opened the event with a bag piper and closed with Christmas carols on the Fleischman Family organ and violin upstairs.

# **Emily Catherine Marks Portrait update**



Emily Catherine Marks (1818-1903) was the wife of Naples abolitionist Billy Marks. His portrait has been preserved and hangs in the Morgan Hose building.

A few weeks ago, Klara Zold from Zold Art Conservation in Corning inspected the painting and is now examining and preparing a written report that will include a recommended treatment and cost estimate for preserving. Thank you to NHS member Rose Hogan for introducing us to her friend Klara Zold!

In the dark days of slavery many a hunted slave seeking freedom, found refuge and help from the Marks'. Like countless other women in American history, she was the humble backbone of the advancing society. We don't think Billy Marks could have accomplished as much without her. We can see small bits of her brave actions in remaining stories, such as burning the wooden planks used for formerly enslaved people to climb into Marks' hearse to escape to safety, so the bloodhounds would lose their trace.

## **Family History Presented**

Bob Metcalf gave a presentation recently to the Naples Historical Society Board about his ancestor, Jabez Metcalf. Jabez was one of the first settlers of Naples (Watkinstown then) and was one of the most successful businessmen and politicians during the frontier community's first twenty years of existence. Jabez, with good friend Major Benjamin Clark built the first raceway and sawmill. Jabez also saw an urgent need for a tavern and inn so he turned the first floor of his home on Mt. Pleasant Street into the Metcalf Tavern. In April 1796 he was elected the first assessor, the first animal poundmaster and town supervisor.

The words on his stone are:
"Death is a debt to nature due
which I have paid and so will you."

## **Historic District Committee Formed**

Last year, The Landmark Society of Western New York recommended in their "Naples Historic Resources Survey" the potential for three distinct National Register – eligible historic districts as well as Fairview Cemetery. Recently, a committee has been formed to help the Village of Naples apply to the New York State Historic Preservation Office to have these districts listed on the **National Register of Historic Places**. While such designation would not constrain property and business owners in any way, it would make available tax credits and other opportunities. It also attracts new residents, businesses, and visitors, and recognizes and documents the community's development and history. To assist with the cost of this important project, a grant application is being sent to the preservation League of New York State. **Watch for announcements on public meetings which will be scheduled over the coming months to answer your questions.**
