

Summer 2025 Updates: Preservation Activities

It's been hard not to notice the Society's preservation activities going on around the Village of Naples this summer! NHS Board Members have been leading exciting projects, and thanks to our fundraising and generous sponsors, we're able to engage the services of many local talents — not to mention, all the energy & muscle shared by volunteer helpers. Thank you, all!













• Peter Schmitt completed

- masonry work on the top of the basement external staircase.
- Charlie Kingsley made repairs to both Northwest rotting corners of the building, and built a sturdy new door for the external staircase.
- Liddiard's Tree Experts of Middlesex removed 5 trees from around the house, in preparation for the next steps: the removal of the buildup of several years' soil to expose the stone foundation, which Peter Schmitt will check for any needed repairs.
- The entire building was measured in order to generate the CAD drawings for defining needed porch repairs.
- During a series of "work days." NHS President Trish Lambiase and a team of volunteers began efforts to re-build a beautiful stone wall that once complimented the house. Level 1 Dry Stone Waller Vincent Feucht estimates a 40' long, 30" deep wall, to be planned.
- Board Member and Horticulturalist Jun Liu researched and wrote educational content for garden stake signs to highlight native plantings around the Cleveland House grounds.

Naples Red Mill Report by Wayne Buchar

Work continues on the restoration of the Red Mill (Bill's Dream). The current focus has been on the repair/ stabilization and preservation of the **Rail Station Office** (RSO) attached to the East side of the mill. It was added to the side of the Mill in about 1910. It was used as a working office to package, weigh and coordinate shipments to and from the Lehigh Valley Train Depot on Academy Street. It contained a wood stove for heat during the winter. Might it not make an interesting handicap bathroom in the future? After the RSO is stabilized it will be possible for us to complete the new Hemlock siding on the south and east sides of the mill.

Part I, phase I of our longterm plan for the Mill has been completed! The Waterwheel pit has been cleaned out, the bulging basement stone walls have been repaired and rebuilt, some outside stone foundation walls were repointed.

Next time you visit, appreciate the nice job by Charlie Kingsley on the stairs at our main entry: a tidy paint job and installation of easier-to-grab railings on both sides of the steps, plus copper caps on the posts.



Fairview Cemetery

(Recently added to the National **Register of Historic Places)**

- Significant progress has been made on headstone cleaning and restoration, thanks to the ongoing work of Ken Poole and Dave Bloom and many volunteers who accepted the invitation to join them on Wednesdays throughout the summer.
- There is a possibility that the stone of Ephraim Cleveland has been found..!
- We are working with the Town of Naples on tree and brush removal.
- Several iris bulbs were planted to enhance the cemetery entrance: donations from Jeanne Cease, and native plantings relocated from the Cleveland House.

April 25, 2025 - "The Big Reveal" in front of Memorial Town Hall NHS President Trish Lambiase and John French (Rotarian and President of the Naples Grape Festival LLC) unveiled a new marker to commemorate the origin of Grape Pie in Naples, New York! In 2024, the Naples Historical Society applied for a grant from the William G. Pomeroy Foundation, in their "Hungry for History" category, which recognizes historically significant local and regional foods. NHS Board Members researched archival materials for substantiation and the grant was awarded. The new marker came to Naples last fall, just waiting to be revealed this spring on National Historic Marker Day, which is the last Friday each April, inviting volunteers and communities to come together to maintain and celebrate their markers.

July 19, 2025 - Headstone Repair Class - Back by popular demand, "Gravestone Guy" Dave Bloom (above) and Naples Town Historian Ken Poole hosted an instructional presentation at Morgan Hose Building followed by immediate hands-on experience at Fairview Cemetery, just off North Main St in Naples. Ken and volunteers continued the work in Fairview this summer - an exciting project that has stirred a lot of interest and sharing of stories new and old about the people interred there.

History Talk & Art Show Honor Naples Artist Ira Randall

Nearly four decades after his death, a local artist renowned for his paintings of landscapes and landmarks in the Bristol Hills and Naples will be remembered with an exclusive exhibition of dozens of his original paintings in a show that opens with a free lecture on his life and art. Longtime Naples artist and teacher Ira Randall "is a local legend," said Naples historian Kenton Poole, who spent months researching Randall's career and assembling the exhibition of his art on loan from collectors. "The amount of history he lived through is incredible," said Poole, who will use his talk on Randall's life from 1903 to 1986 as a window into life in Naples and the Bristol Hills in the early and mid-20th Century.

Randall, who taught in Naples schools for 30 years, was a self-taught artist. Hundreds of his paintings from his prolific career decorate the homes of people throughout the region. In talking to Randall's family, friends, and other collectors of his paintings, Poole obtained permission to exhibit dozens of Randall's paintings. "Ira did his paintings en plein air, meaning on the scene outdoors, usually all in one day, so there are hundreds of paintings in existence," Poole said. In his later years, Randall served as art director at the Woodcroftery Shops in Wayland, where he made decorative bowls and baskets.

* Poole's lecture and portions of the exhibition will take place in the Grange's second-floor auditorium, which is not handicap-accessible. Some of the paintings from the exhibition will be on display on the handicap-accessible first floor.

* His talk and the exhibition are jointly sponsored by the Naples Historical Society and the Bristol Hills Historical Society.
